Building Improvement Plan

COURSE SELECTION

During the first week of January, we will begin the process of course selection for the 2016-2017 school year. Students will attend assemblies to hear about the process, and guidance counselors will visit a class on every level to discuss course selection. Students will have until 4 February to discuss courses with teachers, counselors, and parents and guardians: all course selection must be completed by **4 February**.

Please encourage your child to take full advantage of this time in order to make the best choices for the next school year. We make some changes in June, but many classes are closed; changes cost \$40. Students are best served to make wise choices now. The entire course book is posted on the school web site now. Students may choose to take an extra credit or an H period class if they are in good academic standing and have good attendance and punctuality. There is no application form. Students who do not meet the criteria for H period or extra credits will be removed from these extra classes. Pre-registration for certain classes will begin on Sunday, 24 January. There is information about pre-registration on the web site, and students will get more information at assemblies and during class visits.

We encourage students to take the most appropriately challenging classes for which they are eligible. This selection is unique for each student. Please encourage your child to speak with his or her

teachers and guidance counselor to make the best decision. Each department has its own criteria for honors and A.P. classes and its own process for receiving approval. Classrooms teachers are the best source of information about getting approval for honors classes. Guidance counselors will give advice about a student's overall course load.

Please contact your child's guidance counselor or Mr. Castellano (ext. 209) with questions about course selection.

PSAT RESULTS

Our sophomore and junior students took the PSAT in October. The PSAT is a practice test for the SAT, a major college admission test. About 2% of the students in the nation receive recognition from the National Merit Scholarship Corporation based on their PSAT results. Each year, we have between 10 and 15 students who are so recognized. For the vast majority of students, however, the PSAT serves as practice and preparation for the SAT. PSAT scores are not seen by colleges and do not influence college acceptance.

We recently received a message from the College Board, the organization that oversees the PSAT and SAT, informing us that students will receive an e-mail in early January; this e-mail will provide them with an access code so they can view their PSAT results. At that time, we will also return to students their test booklet. Later in January, we will have assemblies on how to understand the results, interpret the score report, and prepare for the SAT. We encourage students to go over the score report with parents and guardians and to review their entire test on their own. English and Math teachers will take a class to go over some of the questions. Students with questions about the PSAT should speak with their guidance counselor.

All juniors should take the SAT or the ACT (another major college admission test) sometime in the Spring semester. Colleges accept either SAT or ACT scores for applications. SAT and ACT scores are important because they influence college acceptance and can qualify students for various scholarships. Juniors should discuss the time of the test with their parents and guardians and their guidance counselors. We strongly recommend that all students do some type of explicit test preparation. This preparation may be a course, individual tutoring, or using a test preparation book or on-line program. That is a family decision. Please feel free to call your child's guidance counselor to discuss this decision.

Sophomores will take the PSAT again in the Fall of junior year. There is information available on the College Board web site: www.collegeboard.org.

SAT scores are important, but they are 1 piece of the application package students will send to colleges in the Fall of senior year. Colleges also look at the following items: overall average; classes taken; level of difficulty of classes; extra-curricular activities; service; recommendations; student essay. Receiving the PSAT is a good opportunity for students to re-dedicate themselves to their school work. Good grades in good classes are as important as good SAT scores, and good work in school will also result in improved SAT scores.

SAT REGISTRATION

The College Board offers the SAT at many locations on different dates throughout the Spring. Students may check this information at www.collegeboard.org. Registration is done through the College Board web site. This Spring, St. Francis Prep is offering the SAT on Saturday, 7 May. We encourage students who want to take the SAT at St. Francis Prep to register early: there are a limited number of seats available, and these seats fill up early. St. Francis Prep does not control who gets to take the test at the school. Please encourage your child to register early. Students should do explicit test preparation. We wish students all the best on this phase on college preparation.

A Message from Mr. Woods, Director of Technology

In January, we will be conducting pre-registration (Jan. 24th, for some classes) and overall course registration (Jan. 28th) for next school year. Students will need to log in to the PowerSchool Student Portal to register. Students who have lost their PowerSchool Portal passwords should go to the Computer Lab in W201 to get a replacement password.

December was a busy month for Prep's Music Department. Junior violinist and Concertmistress of Prep's Chamber Orchestra, Georgia Herrera, was selected to perform as a member of the New York State School Music Association's (NYSSMA) All-State Symphony Orchestra from December 3rd to 6th. Georgia earned this opportunity based on her perfect score at her NYSSMA festival solo adjudication last May.

On December 2nd, our Chamber Orchestra presented an assembly concert for students at St. Kevin Catholic Academy. Our Chamber Choir helped bring some Christmas cheer to Prep's annual Christmas Tree Lighting on December 4th. On December 6th, our Jazz Band lent a helping hand to St. Francis College, when they performed at Madison Square Garden as the college's Pep Band. On December 17th, students from the Chamber Orchestra performed at Presentation Parish Soup Kitchen to help enliven a special Holiday meal for those in need in the Presentation Parish community. And on December 19th, the Chamber Orchestra performed at Prep's Party for Our Friends with Special Needs.

But the highlight of the month was the Music Department's annual Christmas Concerts. In all, over two nights, 11 ensembles and over 550 students shared their talents with sold out audiences. Alvernians and National Honor Society Toy Project

For the past five years, the NHS Franciscan Chapter has assisted P.S. 65 with their Christmas Toy Project. Mr. Jeff Adler, parent of three SFP alumni, works at the Mother Hale Academy, Public School 65, located in the South Bronx. Most, if not all, of the students come from families that live at or below the federal poverty line. Together with the student actors and crew of [The Christmas Carol](#), over 250 presents were given to the children in Grade 2-5.



Bio-Tech and AP Biology Classes

On Tuesday, December 15th, Ms. Ashkenazy's Biotechnology and Mr. Boylan's AP Biology classes visited the Cold Spring Harbor Laboratory in Lake Success; this is the North Shore- Long Island Jewish Health Systems Lab. The students participated in a lab to help them better understand their own ancestry. During this trip, students were given the ability to use cutting edge, high-tech equipment to test their DNA for the presence or absence of an ALU gene. The AIU gene is a "jumping gene," a DNA

sequence that reproduces by copying itself and inserting itself into new chromosome locations. The ALU gene only “jumps” into certain nationalities, such as Asia, or certain parts of northern Spain. The presence or absence of this gene enables the students to gain insight into their ancestral origins dating back to 1,000 years ago. The students were then able to see their results by using some of the latest technology, a Chip Analyzer. The Chip Analyzer analyzed the student’s DNA and allowed them to compare individual results by graphing the information. Students then went on a tour of North Shore-LIJ’s Clinical Core Lab, which is one of America’s most modern medical laboratories. They were able to see where blood samples are taken to and how they are analyzed. About 90% of the operations within the lab are done robotically.

On December 1, the following students provided community service here at the American Cancer Society’s Hope Lodge: Daniel Diaz, Mike Mavra, Chris Mecir, Bryan Reinah, and Antonio Spaleta. These young men, in partnership with their mothers, served dinner to the guests of Hope Lodge. The hours they spent here included set up of the space, dinner and beverage service, and clean up. Most important, they enlightened the spirits of the 60 patients and caregivers who are calling Hope Lodge their temporary home while in New York City for treatment.
